As the United Church of Canada, our focus is clearly named to be Social Justice. We say that we offer hope and support to those who need it most - whoever they are. We do our best to make our actions mirror our words... even when it's hard or unpopular to do.

"Love Your Neighbour" Jesus said. But we can't do it alone. It takes more than one village to support God's children, our neighbours, all around the world. For some folk, this is a time when they feel most alone as they find themselves without people to welcome them or prepare for them. We all have a role to take to be the Love. The poor, the lonely, the broken, the sick, the young are depending on us to get it right.

I invite you to join us in the last three weeks of the Church Lenten Journey. Come and hear the challenges and the joys of Loving our Neighbours. During Holy Week, on Thursday, Friday and Sunday, come and be reminded of the stories of our faith that tell us that, even through the worst of circumstance, God walks beside us and lifts us into new life when we are ready for it.

May you feel God's spirit with you. May your Love of Neighbour shine into the world through your words and actions. Blessings to you on this most Holy Time of our Faith.
